The filtration plant was built by the City of Owen Sound to filter their drinking water. These unique underground caverns are now 100 years old. Don't miss the opportunity to participate in this event. Participants should wear appropriate footwear as the terrain is moderate and not wheel chair accessible.

St Clair Region Conservation Authority is giving you the chance to explore L.C. Henderson Conservation Area with a "Geocaching Twist".

Geocaching is a high-tech treasure hunt which uses a global positioning system (GPS) unit to locate a hidden cache (treasure). Walk along the trails of the 115 hectare wetlands/forested habitat and bring your GPS receiver to discover the excitement of Geocaching. A limited number of GPS receivers will be available to borrow. A laptop will be set up to upload the coordinates to your GPS (if your GPS needs a special cable please bring it).
